<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Aspects of change in national life • Events beyond living memory that are significant nationally or globally e.g. first aeroplane flight/first moon landing • Use common words and phrases relating to the passing of time • Where people they study fit into a chronological framework • Identify similarities and differences between different life periods • Wide range of vocabulary of everyday historical terms • Ask and answer questions • Use sources to understand key features of events • Understand different ways to find out about the past and how it can be represented in different ways 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Know that Amy Johnson was the first woman to fly solo to Australia • Know that solo means on your own • Know that Amy Johnson flew to Australia in 1930 in a plane called Jason • Know that the journey took 19 and a half days • Know that the flight started in Croyden and ended in Darwin • Know that in 1931, Amy Johnson made the fastest flight from England to Japan in 8 days • Know that 1932, she made the fastest flight to South Africa and back again in 11 days • Know that 1933, she was the first person to fly all the way to America without stopping • Know that Amy Johnson died on 5th January 1941 delivering a plane to Oxford • Know how aeroplanes have changed over time • Know what modern pilots are like compared to Amy Johnson • Know how transport has changed over time • Know how to create a chronological timeline • Know that the Titanic set sail on the 10th April 1912. • Know that the Titanic's maiden voyage from Southampton to New York across the Atlantic Ocean • Know that the Titanic hit an iceberg and sank on 15th April 1912 • Know what happened between the Titanic hitting the iceberg and sinking • Know that 2223 passengers on board and 706 survived • Use a range of sources e.g. photographs, paintings, eyewitness accounts to find out about Amy Johnson and the Titanic • Compare two versions of the same event • Discuss the reliability of two sources e.g. photographs/accounts
